DEAR PARENTS, GUARDIANS, AND FRIENDS,

It's April and there are only 12 weeks left in the school year. It's time for a little SPRING CLEANING! (And a little warm weather

Please make sure that all of your child's contact information is up to date (address, phone numbers, contact people, etc.) To do this, please stop in the main office or call 278-7900 during school hours.

The same holds true for all of your child's medical information. Just contact our nurse, Mrs. Snyder at 278-7907.

Here are a few important reminders regarding arrival to school and departure from school. Please make sure that your child arrives to school - ON TIME! There have been too many incidents of tardiness. The doors are open at 8:45 am (8:30 am for breakfast students). School begins at 9:00 am. Please drop your child off at the 8:45 am bell if they are not having breakfast. On the

other hand, please do not drop off students too early in the morning. We do not have staff to supervise them before 8:30 and we don't want them staying outside unattended. If you need your child to get to school early due to work or other commitments, you can inquire about the latchkey program at 79th Street School operated by the Boys and Girls Club.

DISMISSAL: If you need to make alternate plans for pick-up after school, please arrange this ahead of time and send in a note. We understand that emergencies may arise causing a pick up change on the rare occasion. We are releasing 470 children. Daily calls to the office at the last minute make dismissal confusing and difficult for us and your child. Bus students are already out of their classes and boarding busses by 2:45 (1:45 on Tuesdays). ALSO...The office staff leaves at 3:00 and 3:15 each day. Their work day is from 7:30-3:00

and 8:15-3:15. DON'T BE LATE!

Please pick up your children by 3:00 each day (2:00 on Tuesday). After 3:00 p.m., we do not have staff available to supervise these children for your late arrival. Too frequently, staff stays beyond their work day because of students left at school.

school during the day, you must always enter from the front and proceed directly to the office.


As I'm sure you are aware, we cannot be TOO careful in this day and age! These rules are not meant to insult you, they are meant for the continued safety of our children. Tight se-

PRINCIPAL'S BOOK OF THE MONTH FOR OCTOBER



The Principal's Book of The Month for October is <u>The Honest to Goodness Truth</u>, written by, Patricia McKissack. When Libby is caught in her first lie to her mama, her own shame far outweighs the punishment dealt out by her mother, and she makes a vow: "From now on, only the truth." But the girl's strict enforcement of her own rule soon lands her in deep water. Soon she's spreading the truth all over townabout the hole in her friend Ruthie May's sock in front of everybody, and the fact that Thomas didn't have lunch money and needed to borrow some from the teacher, and how old Miz Tusselbury's yard looks like a jungle. By now, no one is talking to Libby. Perplexed and glum,

she turns to her mama for another lesson on telling the truth. Her promise to "tell the truth no matter how much it hurt" leaves a trail of wounded feelings and offended people, but Libby doesn't understand the reactions she's getting until her beloved horse is called an "old flea-ridden swayback." When Libby gets a small spoonful of her own medicine she really grasps the difference between the right way and the wrong way to tell the truth. Libby learns that it's not always necessary to blurt out the whole truth either.

Children know just how difficult it is to find that balance between a lie and the honest-to-goodness truth. The heroine's heart is in the right place, and she works through her confusion in recognizable, easily followed stages.
