<p><b>4.OA.A.3</b> Solve multistep word problems posed with whole numbers and having whole-number answers using the four operations, including problems in which remainders must be interpreted. Represent these problems using equations with a letter standing for the unknown quantity. Assess the reasonableness of answers using mental computation and estimation strategies including rounding.</p> <p><b>4.NBT.A.1</b> Recognize that in a multi-digit whole number, a digit in one place represents ten times what it represents in the place to its right. For example, recognize that <math>700 \div 70 = 10</math> by applying concepts of place value and division.</p> <p><b>4.NBT.A.2</b> Read and write multi-digit whole numbers using base-ten numerals, number names, and expanded form.
